BBC documentary 'The Whistleblowers; Inside the UN'

For the avoidance of any doubt, and in response to a number of questions I have been asked following release of this documentary I wish to clarify the following:

- 1 The "hands in the pants" audio recording, where Swanson described an indecent assault on a female D1, was made in a meeting of all the OIOS investigators in New York in February 2018. To the best of my knowledge; *none of the investigators* present expressed any reservations about the fact nothing was done to even interview the ASG who had assaulted the victim.
- 2 Although there was *speculation* that that ASG the "*favored son*" was Fabrizio Hochschild; that has **never been proved** and in the final analysis; I do not know their identity.
- **3** I believe there are basically only two possible interpretations of the audio recording, either:
 - a) (If Swanson was *telling the truth*) it is evidence of Antonio Gutterres
 - i) being *uninterested* in a serious criminal allegation against one of his senior staff;
 - ii) *not caring* if women in the UN are sexually assaulted, even inside the Headquarters and, therefore
 - iii) being quite happy for the matter to be *covered up* and *NOT* investigated, or, alternatively
 - b) (*if Swanson was lying*) it is evidence of him saying something false and clearly with defamatory intent, to discredit the Secretary-General *and suffering no consequences for it*.

I do not know which it might be, but I do not consider *either* to be acceptable.

- 4 I brought the matter to the attention of the Secretary-General on 7 June 2020 (i.e. *two years ago*) and, regardless of the interpretation of what Swanson said on the tape,
 - a) it is apparent that the Secretary-General did *nothing* about it, and
 - b) it is a matter of public record that Swanson was subsequently *promoted* to be ASG/OIOS in July 2021.
- 5 I stand by the statement that I made on that program; I do believe the UN is **riddled with** corruption from bottom to top but 'corruption' does not mean bribery *with cash*.
- 6 I worked in OIOS for four years until 2015 when, disgusted with the management of the office and the institutionalised bias in what passes for a "justice system" in the UN; I let my contract expire without seeking its renewal. On the basis of that experience, and of reviewing numerous investigation reports in the years since, I believe OIOS and the other investigative bodies in the UN system to be a large part of the problem and *not* any part of the solution.
